SESSION SYNOPSIS OF FEBRUARY 27, 2025

The February Session Meeting was held on February 27th with nine Elders in attendance and with our Associate Pastor in Residence, Pastor Julia, moderating the meeting for this first time. Her moderating a Session Meeting is a part of the experience and exposure that has been scheduled during her time with us in preparation for a future role for her as the Pastor of a congregation.

The February Meeting was also the Annual Joint Meeting with Deacons where all Deacons are invited to attend, and their work and activity is discussed and applauded. As a reminder, the current Board of Deacons consists of: Beth Germann, (Moderator), Sheya Bennett, Jason Gordon, Jim Peyton, Gina Peyton, Ben Keller, Paul Knauff, Connie Knauff, Jean Patton, Bonnie Swarner, Betty Richardson and Denise Walker.

Pastor Kim affirmed to Session and to the Deacons what a vital part of the life of this congregation and how important their caring, connecting and communicating with the members of our congregation is. The Deacons are truly recognized for their work and appreciated.

Pastor Julia expressed that the work of the Deacons with whom she has had the privilege to participate have been some of her most important connection points with our congregation. The Deacons present, many of whom have served as Deacons multiple times over the years, confirmed they enjoy the opportunity being a Deacon provides to them to connect with and build relationships with members they serve. A few of the key comments made included:

- \Rightarrow Deacons 'do' things with and on behalf of our members and that is meaningful to them.
- \Rightarrow As Deacons they feel they are the hands and feet of the church.
- \Rightarrow Connecting with members, in-person or even via telephone, is important to the members and that importance comes through to the Deacons.
- \Rightarrow Love is a verb...and the Deacons exemplify that with their time with members.
- ⇒ Once you can make a meaningful connection with members who often can't get to church, that results in a relationship built to last over many years.
- \Rightarrow They highly recommend being a Deacon to all church members; it is an experience that brings personal satisfaction from serving others.

Other Items of Note

- ⇒ Sharon Kinsey attended the February Assembly meeting of Presbytery and reported that the focus of our Presbytery in 2025 will be on 'the Radical Message of Jesus.' Jesus called us to be committed and to communicate, to show mercy, be welcoming, encourage justice and to protect vulnerable people. We need to stick together as we try to do what Jesus called us to do.
- ⇒ Finance Team Moderator Jerry Kahrs presented findings of the just-received outside audit report which included the statement there were "no material issues identified."
- ⇒ iEngage Team and Buildings & Grounds Team, in conjunction with Director of Technology Jeff Whitney, have installed and are testing a 'hearing enhancement' system in the Sanctuary that "should" allow individuals with hearing aids AND Bluetooth capability between their cell phone and their hearing aids to be able to have 'enhanced' sound in the Sanctuary without feedback from the speakers already emitting sound in the Sanctuary. If it works as expected, it will be permanently installed.

MOTIONS APPROVED

- The Job Description for the role of Treasurer at FPCVG as presented by the Personnel Team. This will be used when speaking to anyone about what this role for our church entails. Today, and for the past several decades, our church has had a volunteer in this part-time role. However, that may not always be the case if a qualified and interested volunteer is not available and willing to serve. Remaining to be determined is the estimated number of hours per month this role requires of a person.
- Policy & Procedures Guideline: For Weaponry on Church Premises that calls for posting that "the possession of firearms, knives (other than small pocket knives), explosives or any other weapons is strictly prohibited on church property." This policy statement was presented by the Polity Task Force and will be posted at all entrances and elsewhere on church property.
 - This policy applies to all individuals on church property, including but not limited to congregants, staff, volunteers, contractors and visitors.
 - O Holders of concealed weapons permits are NOT exempt from this policy unless they meet the identified Exceptions in the policy for Uniformed or Badge-Carrying Law Enforcement Officers or have special written prior permission by Session.
- ➤ A banner, presented by iEngage, to be installed above the name badge holding area in the Narthex that recognizes FPCV as a member of the Covenant Network and confirms we are a 'welcoming' church. The banner includes symbols displaying all the "inclusionary" symbols such as those welcoming those in wheelchairs, those with hearing impairments, et.al.
- **Funds raised during Vacation Bible Church** to be used for purchasing backpacks and other school supplies.



A Zen saying.....

If there is light in the soul, There is beauty in the person, If there is beauty in the person, There will be harmony in the house, If there is harmony in the house, There will be order in the nation, If there is order in the nation, There will be peace in the world.

To some, this saying may seem quaint. After all, given the current level of division and animus in our country; shifting alliances throughout the world; on-going wars and the unwillingness among countries (including our own) to work together to solve pressing existential problems that threaten all life, our world (like an individual experiencing severe emotional breakdown) seems to be becoming increasingly disordered.

So how might we expect the practice of gratitude to rectify this strife? To understand how gratitude can affect a society more broadly, perhaps we, first, need to recognize that it's opposite is *resentment*. Resentment is a complex multilayered emotion of grievance. It is often described as a mixture of disappointment, disgust and anger frequently resulting from a *perceived or real* insult or injury. Inherent in resentment is a perception of unfairness and "sense of lack."

When we understand the underlying emotions that contribute to resentment it is not hard to recognize resentment in the public sphere, often *intentionally* played out daily before our eyes and ears. It has infected our country and society (one of the richest in the world) and our personal relationships.

But, friends, the opposite of resentment is gratitude! With that in mind, I am sharing the following article which suggests that the virtue of gratitude, internalized and more broadly practiced, can steer us back to a stronger sense of personal integrity and, ultimately, contribute to a more stable world. Perhaps that is what Jesus meant when he invoked the idea of "the kingdom."

GRATITUDE: THE LIGHT IN THE SOUL, continued

How Can Our Gratitude Contribute to World Peace? By Dr. Carrie Howells

If we are to bring about world peace, we first need to ask ourselves if how we think and what we say and do can make a difference. This is not a trite question. We need to ask this first if gratitude is to have relevance and be a transformative force.

Gratitude brings light to the soul because it shines a light on our sense of interconnectedness with one another. It immediately awakens us to what we receive from each other. This extends beyond our immediate connections with people we know personally to include a wide array of people who contribute to our world. For example, just reflecting on gratitude for the rice we are about to eat at mealtimes can expand our awareness of those who planted the rice in India and then to those who harvested the rice and transported it and sold it. Thousands of people could have our thanks extended to them in this way.

Such a sense of interconnectedness brightens the 'light in our soul' because it moves us out of our individualism and separateness and towards a recognition of our absolute dependence on others. This may make us feel less indifferent to the senseless hurt inflicted on others. The philosopher Emmanuel Levinas has argued that it is a sense of interconnectedness that is required if we are to assume the "radical responsibility" for the other that is needed to make us act ethically and behave truly as a human being.

When we acknowledge what we receive from another it has a motivating force that urges us to give back. One of the most powerful ways to give back is to acknowledge to others what we have received from them. This brings about what the social anthropologist Margaret Visser describes as "reconnaissance" – recognition of the others' value in their very humanness through expressing gratitude to them.

For example, if we go to the corner store and the shopkeeper looks tired at 9:00 p.m. after a long day's work, we might say something like: "I really appreciate your efforts in keeping the store open this late at night so I am able to buy this milk." It seems like such a small gesture but one that could have an enormous impact in a world where that shopkeeper is seen as someone who is there solely to provide a transactional service, so not particularly deserving of our thanks. Every time we express genuine gratitude, we are basing our relationships less on transactions and more on a sense of appreciation for being given to by another. As sociologist Georg Simmel says, gratitude provides the moral cohesion of humankind.

"Most importantly she teaches us that we cannot give affirmation – this reconnaissance through gratitude – to ourselves. It must be given to us by others."

When people feel recognized through the gratitude expressed by others, they feel more affirmed. Margaret Visser tells us that this is essential to our sense of belonging, identity and relationships. Most importantly she teaches us that we cannot give affirmation – this reconnaissance through gratitude – to ourselves. It must be given to us by others.

Gratitude also shines a light on the state that is its opposite – resentment. The words we use towards and about others are key points of reflection as to whether they arise from resentment or gratitude. If we find ourselves backbiting or gossiping or disparaging, we are doing the opposite of reconnaissance or interconnectedness. We are separating and dividing ourselves from others and disaffirming them.

At the core of most wars and atrocities is the resentment we hold in our hearts. Our reflection on how we could do things differently next time, not only steers us back towards gratitude and personal integrity, but is a crucial step towards world peace. We are taking 'radical responsibility.' Our own gratitude can make a difference.


