A Good, Healthy Goodbye

In some group counseling sessions, there is an exercise that seems to help people say goodbye. In group therapy, the members and therapist (usually around ten people or so) gather in a standing circle. The therapist passes around a basket full of polished rocks. The rocks vary in color, each being unique. Each member takes a rock as a remembrance of the time spent in the group.

Then, still in the circle, with their left hand the group members are asked to grab the left thumb of the person on their left. After a little bit of chaos and several redundant explanations, the group arrives at a tight inner circle of hands joined in the center of the circle.

Beginning with one member of the group, the person reaches into the inner circle of hands with their right hand and verbally released something (one word) into the circle. As the person pulls their hand out of the inner circle, they take something out (one word). For example, when I participated in the exercise, I put my right hand into the circle of hands, reached deep and released "fear" and pulled out "courage." Another person reached into the circle of hands and released "depression" and pulled out "hope."

When everyone had finished the final part of the exercise there was another very powerful portion. Each person took a turn. The person made eye contact slowly and deliberately with each person in the group and said, "Thank you and goodbye."

Generally, most people are not very good at goodbyes. We prefer not to address this important part of relationships. There is a time for "Hello" and there is a time for "Goodbye." Goodbyes do not necessarily mean that we will never see each other again. It means that something has changed and has come to an end. The group will never be the same. Some parts of the relationship will change. Some of the old will disappear. Something new will take place.

Goodbyes are part of the Bible.

Jesus said goodbye to his disciples at the Last Supper. He said goodbye to the world as he breathed his last breath on the cross. He said goodbye to his faithful followers as he appeared to them in the Upper Room. I don't think those goodbyes were easy, but they were necessary. Jesus told his close followers it was necessary for him to go so that something new might begin. This new thing that God was going to do was to send the Holy Spirit to guide and direct the followers of Christ.

By the time you read this newsletter my last Sunday will have come and gone. How was your goodbye to me? How was mine to you?

How did you feel about our goodbye? Did you avoid it? Did you expect something to happen that did not? Did you take an active role in making sure there was a goodbye? Was it a wonderful goodbye?

I have several pieces of good news. The Session has indicated that a goodbye party for Toby and me is scheduled for Sunday, November 18th. On this one family service, we will say goodbye. So, we have time to reflect upon a healthy goodbye.

Session Synopsis of October 15, 2018

Your Session is feeling all of the same emotions that you the congregation are feeling regarding the departure of our beloved pastors Mark and Toby. In his devotions, Elder Doyll Andrews tried to address some of those feelings by citing scripture, in particular, excerpts from letters of Paul regarding his ministry. Dr. Mark Mueller. At the same time, they moved, seconded, and approved having a **Called Session Meeting** on Thursday, November 1, 2018, at 7:00 p.m. for the purpose of discussing the establishment of a Pastoral Nominating Committee and for the approval of a job description for a Director of Christian Education and Youth Ministry. Elders want the congregation to know that they are moving forward quickly and decisively in their search for our next pastor.

Also looking forward, Finance Moderator Elizabeth Monroe distributed a draft of the proposed 2019 Budget for Elders to peruse. Moderators were asked to look at current expenditures compared with what is being requested, especially in regards to restricted accounts. The final budget should be approved at the regularly scheduled November meeting. Stewardship Moderator Rhonda Coffin also gave an update regarding our fall giving campaign.

Monthly Team reports were all approved with only one Action Item coming from the Worship Team. **Times for the Christmas Eve Services will be at 4:00 p.m. (traditional service) and 7:00 p.m. (contemporary service),** similar to the schedule from last year.

Fund Gifts with IRA Required Minimum Distributions (RMD)

Beginning at age 70 ¹/₂, you are required to take a specified amount (your RMD) out of your IRA each year. You must now pay the taxes you avoided when you put the money in the IRA, unless you take advantage of the Qualified Charitable Deduction provision.

Since the IRS raised the standard deduction to \$12,000 (single) and \$24,000 (married), most of us will no longer get an additional benefit from itemizing our charitable deductions. Donating part or all of your RMD is a prudent way for those 70 1/2 and over to fund charitable giving.

By directing that the yearly mandatory withdrawal (RMD) from your IRA be made directly to an IRS approved charity, such as the church, you do not pay income tax on this money. You do not have to direct 100% of your RMD to the charity but, of course, only the donated portion would get the tax benefit. You can also donate to more than one charity.

You may also gain additional benefits, such as:

- 1. Lowering the portion of your Social Security income subject to taxation
- 2 Keeping Medicare premiums low

You can do this directly through the custodian of your IRA account, or with the help of your accountant, or financial planner. There are a few very simple requirements:

- 1. The check must not pass through your hands.
- 2. It must be written by the custodian of your IRA directly to the charity or charities.
- 3. Contact custodian and do the paper work <u>now</u> (or by early December) to insure checks get mailed by December 31.
- 4. You will need an acknowledgement of your gift from each charity.

By all means, do consult your accountant or financial advisor if you need further guidance regarding the use of your IRA distributions to make charitable gifts.

Christian Food Pantry

In September, two hundred and twenty-nine families were served at the pantry providing food for four hundred and sixty-nine people. As of this report, almost all of the food served has been purchased with pantry funds. Usually there are some extra items donated along with basics for the clients to choose from but there are a minimal number of things available for this purpose; however, breads and sweets are offered from items picked up by volunteers at Strack and Van Til's on Calumet. Volunteers are able to provide the customary items offered, but there is a concern about being able to provide the usual Thanksgiving menu items for the holiday. Those that are needed are:

Deacon Doings

Deacons Twenty Centuries Later

Deacons date from a time so early in the church the twelve Apostles were the session. Seriously! See Acts 6. That was the first of many delegations of duty necessary so the church could grow to 2.3 billion believers, one third the world's population. But deacons might never have happened except for a political controversy.

The Greek Christians claimed the Hebrew Christians were discriminating against Greek widows. The dispute brought a second problem into focus. "It is not desirable for us [Apostles] to neglect the word of God in order to serve tables" (Acts 6:2). Both problems were solved at once. Seven deacons (not so called until later) would serve food to the needy, freeing up the apostles to "devote [themselves] to prayer and the ministry of the word" (6:4).

If a Presbyterian church decides to have deacons today, their "ministry... is one of compassion, witness and service, sharing in the redeeming love of Jesus Christ for the poor, the hungry, the sick, the lost, the friendless,... or anyone in distress" (Book of Order G-2.0201). Duties needn't end there. "Deacons may also be given special assignments... such as caring for members in need, handling educational tasks, cultivating liberality in giving, collecting and disbursing monies... or overseeing buildings and property..."(G-2.0202). That list covers most of what the Valparaiso session does. Congregations may also choose to have no deacons at all.

Valparaiso deacon duties are close to the basic Book of Order (2.0201) ministry without a lot of "special assignments." Things still change, through innovation, variation in needs for service, and the number of deacons. Session has made substantial reductions over a three year transition period that ends this year. A twenty-four member board was cut to twelve, and may enter 2019 with as few as nine deacons. This has led to some changes and more are likely to come.

But when it comes to dealing with change nothing tops that first century deacon board. One day Deacon Stephen took up preaching and "full of grace and power... performing wonders and signs among the people" (Acts 6:8).

Opposition to the church was not just culture wars and atheist lawsuits back then; it tended toward mob action. As Deacon Stephan was stoned to death he prayed, as did Jesus on the cross, for God to forgive his murderers (Acts 7:60).

Things we cannot plan for often affect the church more than those for which we can. That's why much biblical advice is about being ready—just being ready for, well... anything. Scripture counsels us as well to plan wisely where we can.

So your deacons plan to continue greeting people on Sunday morning this fall, visiting the home bound, praying for the church and its members, delivering flowers, preparing communion, and generally exercising the gifts of compassion and service. We're also putting aside a little time for the unexpected.

It's a fun group doing God's work, and one you maybe should think about. If you can think of anyone, including yourself, that might want to consider becoming a deacon, let the Nominating Committee know—Doyle Andrews or Jacki Phillips. They can show you a job description and answer your questions.
